NATURAL DYES ON SILK WITH RHYANNAN HALL

THURSDAY 29 APRIL 2021 – 10AM – 4PM



What will you learn?

This is a workshop for witches and alchemists.

For millennia, people across the globe have experimented with the incredible range of natural resources available to them, in order to produce vibrant and rich colours for dyeing cloth. Madder root, cochineal, old fustic and logwood are our colours of choice for this workshop. When skilfully combined with acids, alkali and iron sulphate, they can magically create a whole rainbow of biohues.

In this workshop, students are introduced to ancient natural dyeing processes by experimenting with these four historical plant-based dyes on beautiful silk fabrics before concocting their own colour potion. Through a combination of theory, interactive games and practical experiments, they will gain an insight into the vast world of colour, chemistry and cloth.

Who is your tutor?

UK-based artist Rhyannan Hall is an emerging textile dye specialist, practising traditional dye techniques from the Far East, with a particular fondness for Japanese 'Arashi Shibori' and use of natural dyes.

Splitting her time between London and Bristol, the 31-year-old adopted Arashi Shibori and dyeing as her craft of choice since graduating from the Arts University Bournemouth (2014) and has gone on to train with textile artists from the Royal Opera House. Her contemporary take on artisan practices

invites contemplation of ancient Japanese aesthetics, particularly the philosophy of wabi-sabi - the acceptance of the imperfect nature of life.

Are there any additional costs?

There will be an additional cost of £20 for materials payable to the tutor on the day (Cash please)

What will I need?

Please bring:

An apron and you will need to wear comfy clothes that you don't mind getting messy in.

Tea and coffee will be provided throughout the day, however, please bring a packed lunch with you.

Windows in all rooms will be opened to improve circulation so you may want to bring an extra layer of clothing such as a light jumper or cardigan.

How do I find Kingshill House?

Kingshill House can be found in Kingshill Lane in Dursley, on the road down to the new hospital. The entrance is opposite the Fire Station. The address is: Kingshill House, Kingshill Lane, Dursley, Gloucestershire, GL11 4BZ.

Is there parking?

Kingshill House has a large free car park on site. (Not always guaranteed at busy times)

We will provide morning and afternoon tea & coffee.

Is Kingshill House open?

The House closed in March 2020 in accordance with Government guidelines and the majority of the team were furloughed. The team are now back to work and from the beginning of June 2020 there would normally be a member of our office team on site, during normal office hours. However, on occasion, team members will continue to work from home and the building still remains closed to the general public.

From 4th July 2020, we re-opened our doors, on selected dates, for small, creative workshops.

Only students who have booked spaces, in advance, will be permitted to enter the building when workshops are on.

In line with Government guidance, we will only be running workshops where we are able to maintain social distancing, so all planned workshops will proceed with a reduced number of students; this is to ensure the safety of all (students, tutors and staff.)

I am attending a workshop, what preparations have you made ahead of my visit?

We have spent the last few months of closure, giving the interior of the building a complete redecoration. Every room in the public area of the house has been given a fresh coat of paint.

We have implemented enhanced cleaning regimes in line with Government guidance beginning with a 'deep clean' of the building in readiness for students coming in again on 4th July. Following every workshop, each room and its contents will be thoroughly cleaned to a high standard.

We have reduced the numbers of students per workshop, to between 6 & 8 students, plus the tutor. Our building is spacious, and we have identified our four extra-large training spaces for workshops to take place in.

Each space has been set up to accommodate individual workstations at two metres apart plus a 'demo' station for the tutor.

All workshops in our new programme, have been carefully chosen for their content and ease of demonstration; they are subjects that can be mastered, with minimal equipment requirements and whilst remaining at a single workstation - thereby avoiding the need to move around the room and reducing cross contamination.

During workshops, how will you support social distancing?

We have set up our four extra-large training spaces with individual workstations, one for each individual student and at a distance of two metres apart plus a 'demo' station for the tutor.

All training rooms have large, fully operational windows and a main entrance door. These will be opened during the duration of workshops to ensure each room has adequate ventilation.

Where there is a need to use equipment belonging to tutors in a workshop, each student will have their own set of (pre sterilised) tools to use for the duration of the workshop. Tutors will bring an increased quantity of 'loan' tools and materials for each workshop; this will negate the need to share and ensure that over handling of items is not an issue. (Some workshops require students to bring their own supplies; information about can be found at the top of this page).

Wherever possible, workshop tutors will make use of alternative methods to assist with demonstration techniques for example, close-up live projections.

Where there is more than one workshop running in one day, we will stagger their start, finish, and break times, to minimise the number of people using the same communal areas at once.

Do I need to wear a mask whilst attending workshops?

Students are encouraged to bring and wear their own masks (In public spaces)

Will there be hand sanitiser available?

Generally, each room will have facilities so you can wash your hands regularly (or your room will be in close proximity to the restrooms), but if you want to use hand sanitiser, you are advised to bring your own.

During your visit to us?

You may be asked to follow arrows, follow a one-way system, or wait until facilities like the WC is clear before you use it. It is vital that you follow these instructions – they are for everyone's safety.

To avoid overcrowding in passageways and entrances, we will stagger the break times for all workshops running in one day.

Will lunch still be provided and what food/drink can I expect?

We are currently **not** offering lunch with our workshops, but tea and coffee will be served to you at allocated break times and will be served to you by a designated server.

Please bring your own packed lunch with you.

How is my safety and that of the staff being managed at break/lunchtime?

The safety of our students and staff is our priority. To ensure that social distance is maintained we will be implementing the following:

- Designated server for drinks.
- Drink orders will be taken from you during class and bought to you once prepared.
- Hand sanitiser will be available, and students will be encouraged to use it.

If I feel unwell ahead of a workshop, should I attend?

You should not attend. If you are able, you should contact us to let us know that you are unwell as soon as possible. Unfortunately, we are not able to offer refunds for cancellations, but we will consider issuing you a credit note equivalent to 50% of the workshop fee that you can offset against a future workshop. Will you be increasing your range of workshops in the future?

We have plans to provide more 'safe' spaces here at Kingshill Arts Centre in the future by installing two additional outdoor teaching spaces, in our large, peaceful garden.
